#### A SENSE OF PLACE

Has there ever been an organization with a greater sense of place than Brown Ledge? What we value is what we have always had. Alums and current campers and staff are connected to not only the people and the philosophy of Brown Ledge, but also to the physical camp itself, to water and trees and little cabins with bark siding.

As most of you know, early last month a fire destroyed ten cabins on the eastern side of the grove. After any loss, the body and mind rally to do what is necessary. Early assessments are made and then modified as more information surfaces. News about the event is gathered and distributed - to the board, the staff, the press, and to Brown Ledgers around the world.

The "experts" arrive on the scene. In our case, insurance agents are consulted, the architect is enlisted, the builder is scheduled, and the forester and conservation biologist are invited out to visit. Daily decisions need to be made and clear thinking is required. There is no time to think about what has been lost.

And then..... As the crisis becomes less immediate, there is time for reflection. One side of the grove as we knew it is gone. What now? How do we as Brown Ledgers incorporate this new reality into our sense of our treasured place?

Two days ago, we happened across a picture from 1927 that shows the very first group of Brown Ledgers. (This photo appears on page 2.) Seventeen counselors and twenty six campers are lined up in the grove in bloomers and leggings, midi blouses, and long, draping ties. Behind them are the white and red pines and the cedar trees that characterized the old grove. Through the trees, four cabins and the double decker are visible. The picture provides a stark reminder of not only what we lost, but also of how much had already changed in this

area of camp in the many years before the fire. New cabins were built to accommodate the growing camper population, squeezed in amongst the original grouping. Even more dramatic was the change in vegetation. Slowly over the years, the pines and cedars aged and weakened and because of the rock ledge and shallow soil, many came down prematurely in wind storms. In the 1970s, grass was added

to a section of the grove in front of the dining room (and carefully replanted and nurtured each year) because, without the canopy, the pine floor of the old grove had turned to dust in the dry weather and mud when it rained. And then, after the new dining room was built, we discovered the wood chip! Already, deciduous trees were beginning to replace the pines and cedars, a natural forest progression we're told. The addition of yearly truck loads of wood chips not only made for comfortable and aromatic footing, but more importantly, they began to decompose into more soil so that new trees (this time maples) could be successfully added each fall. The grove was slowly but surely being "re-groved."

Our memories of every part of camp – dining room, theater, waterfront, barn - are shaped by our era at camp. Those of us who came to BLC before the 1970s become nostalgic remembering the old piney

grove and the simple wooden benches that connected trees and provided casual seating there. There is another generation of campers that wistfully recalls lazy hours sprawled on a small

but perfectly located patch of grass. The era of the wood chip already has a strong following. The memories of counselors and JCs spreading impossibly high mounds of chips around camp in preparation for opening day will always symbolize "the grove" to many younger alums. And the campers of 2013 will be excited to be the first residents of new, log-sided cabins that are carefully constructed and placed to fit in with the old.

Most of the time change comes gradually. But sometimes change arrives unexpectedly and dramatically on a windy December Sunday afternoon. **Harry Brown** was most certainly not thinking about anything like a fire when, in his <u>Patterns of Brown Ledge</u>, he wrote, "Change and the unexpected are good, they furnish the salt, the savor, the spice of life." And yet the sentiment

holds, even now. Our traditions ground us, but gradual or dramatic, change is a constant of life. And once again, no matter if the change is chosen or thrust upon us, we Brown Ledgers have proven to be extraordinarily good at moving forward. For many of us, our memories of Fred either involve a "Fred talk" or a vision of him sitting on the upper porch of the point house with his binoculars, listening to the weather channel on the radio in his office.

Switching gears my daughter, Megan, and I recently attended a relative's wedding, who also happens to be a Brown Ledger. My cousin, Meredith Grieff (camper, JC and counselor, 2000s) was married to Patrick Owens on December 8th in Charleston, South Carolina. It was a beautiful ceremony set on the marshes of Wadmalaw Island. They had perfect weather and she was a beautiful bride. A fellow Brown Ledger, Katie Reynolds (Edie Plimpton Fleeman's daughter), attended the ceremony as well. It was great to see her. 

## BELONGING TO A CAMP COMMUNITY TEACHES LESSONS IN GIVING AND RECEIVING

Now that the December holidays are upon us, thoughts turn to family and friends and our collective focus shifts to giving. December provides so many lessons in giving and receiving for children (and for the rest of us). And, there are several genuine opportunities for expressing gratitude. Summer might feel far, far off for some in all the current scurrying about to welcome winter. Not so in the summer camp world! Summer is always with us here at ACA New England. We're inspired by lessons in giving and receiving that come from belonging to a summer camp community, and reminded that those lessons come in summertime and year-round too.

There was a terrible fire on Sunday at Brown Ledge Camp (ACA Accredited) in Vermont. The good news is there were no injuries and the camp and its community of campers, staff, alumnae and families will all recover. The sad news is the fire was started by two boys, aged 14 and 15, playing with matches, fireworks and road flares on a dry, Sunday afternoon as winds at a nearby weather station blew at 35 mph. Heartwarming is the only description for everyone's response to this fire from the local firefighters and neighbors in Colchester and around Mallets Bay on Lake Champlain, to Kathy and Bill Neilson, the camp directors, who have epitomized resilience. Brown Ledge campers will return in summer 2013 to a camp that won't look quite the same with its replacement landscaping and a number of new cabins in what's known as the Grove.

Between now and then, campers will have many opportunities to understand, appreciate, and benefit from the interdependence of their camp in its larger context. You see, at camp, children learn how to belong—how to belong to a camp family and the smaller circles and groups within it, how to belong to the larger camp family of alumni, and how to belong to the world outside of camp. Camp life is a community life, as campers learn how to be contributing community members. In the aftermath of the Brown Ledge fire, we see a camp surrounded and supported by its community. For Brown Ledge campers, it must be reassuring to witness the swift and loving response of neighbors, friends and former campers and staff. There are two major takeaways: 1) When bad things happen, people care and respond—giving is important. 2) It's a sign of strength to accept help—receiving is important as well. It's equally reassuring to be invited to take action immediately. A work weekend June 1-2 is already in the plans. Donations are already being accepted. And a recent post on the camp's Facebook page sums it up, "Words cannot express the joy we feel amongst such a sad time. The love, support and reconnecting is so incredible and so heartfelt. Such a bond, with all the decades of BLC merging together so that we can all create a force that no fire will destroy!"

A camp does not exist solely on the property, but rather, camp also lives in the hearts and minds of the children who get to go and the adults who are lucky enough to teach, mentor, supervise and inspire campers. Life-long relationships often flourish between the people who share summer camp. What happened after Brown Ledge Camp's fire is a reminder to us all.

Because of camp, we're interconnected; we're part of something much larger, which is especially powerful in times of sadness and in times of joy.

When possible, we give, and when necessary, we receive.

We have each other—thanks to this force we call camp!

#### **ANNEX CONSTRUCTION PROJECT**

The new Annex project is moving forward in 2013. Though the grove fire clean up, and rebuild, will take much of camp's attention this winter, the need for more housing for our JCs remains the same. Last summer, we converted Bill and Lori's office, and the JC room, into a temporary JC cabin so that the 21 second years could live together. The second years of 2012 accommodated the temporary fix with typical BLC good humor, and named their cabin the "Squirrel's Nest". As

predicted in last winter's Ledger, our JC numbers continue to run high - as of December 28, 2012, we have 50 Junior Counselors signed up for 2013; 28 first years and 22 second years.

With architectural drawings in hand, and permits approved by the town and state, building

will begin this spring. First, the existing Annex will be moved approximately 30 feet toward the Arts and Crafts building. The current Annex is housing the Theatre's props, and will continue to do so (for building code reasons, we removed all of the flammable props from the theatre — volunteers from work weekend 2012 remember that project well). Second, the new Annex will overlap with the site of the existing Annex building.

The new building's entrance will rotate a quarter turn toward the road. The improved Annex will have space for 24 JCs (without bunk beds). With bunk beds, we can accommodate 26-28 JCs depending on the size of the group.

One of the most exciting parts about this new construction is that former JCs are supporting the current JC program. The Brown Ledge Foundation has received, to date, group gifts for the Annex project from the JCs of 1982,

1985, 1992 and 2004. We hope that more JC groups decide to join together to give as a group during the 2013 Annual Campaign. Imagine how much it would mean to you as a IC this summer to know that your new cabin was built by the contributions of former JCs. The investment



is not only in the physical cabin but in the JC program. If every former JC, who wrote about her JC experience, in a high school essay, or college application essay, contributed to the Annex fund, we could fund our new building entirely by former JC support. Consider rallying your bunkies in 2013! If you attend Alumnae Camp 2013, plan on taking a JC group photo in front of the new JC cabin.
