DIRECTING BLC FOR THIRTY YEARS

For campers, Brown Ledge is a magical place that has stood the test of time. As alums, you may have returned to camp after skipping a few or many summers and realized that very little has changed. It is easy to think of camp as the place where you learned many life lessons,



from how to hit a tennis ball, to riding a horse, to being a friend or dealing with homesickness and disappointment. The reality is that being the directors of camp involves more than any one who has ever not been in charge of everything can ever know. While camp is a great place, the actual reality of making the magic of camp happen has become more and more complicated as the years go by. When Barbara and the Brown Ledge Perpetuators hired Bill and Kathy to be the directors, she asked that they stay for three summers. This year marks the 30th year that Bill and Kathy have been camp directors. That is 10 years longer than Barbara and almost as long as HEB and MPB were the directors.

There is much more to the job than hiring staff and registering campers. As society has changed so have the rules and regulations and amount of paperwork for keeping the facilities and employee hirings up to date. All employees must have social security numbers which means that along with all their work visas, foreign counselors must be taken to the SSA office in Burlington to register. There are now more expectations for instant communication from parents before during and after the summer. We have gone from one phone line at camp which Fred and Twylla answered at night, to 8 different numbers that will get you into camp, as well as internet and wireless access. Of course

there is the added complication of keeping cell phones out of the hands of campers and campers offline while they are here with all kinds of new gadgets that do all kinds of things. There are also the demands of updating

information online and managing all the new technologies of keeping people in touch with camp and using it as a resource to introduce camp to new people.

Maintenance of camp alone is a full time job. With 71 buildings, there are 71 roofs and many screens, doors, smoke alarms, beds, mattresses and a vast array of maintenance with plumbing, gas and electrical lines. During the past 30 years, Bill and Kathy have overseen many huge structural improvements at camp. The addition of two tennis courts, the redesign of the riding rings, the dining room, the camper and counselor bathrooms, the theatre lighting project and the barn are big and visible improvements. Not so glamorous have been the redesign of the sewer system and burying most all of the electrical lines. These projects are largely overseen by Bill, as he does this while also doing the demands of registering campers, hiring staff, and maintaining communication with campers, parents, alumnae and current staff. There are meetings with architects and engineers and construction companies, subcontractors and local officials for permits.

If you have ever worked at camp, you know that hundreds of questions go to Bill and Kathy each day. They are actively but

Having just returned home after my final Board of Directors meeting for Brown Ledge, I chuckle at how every time I leave camp, I find myself trying to figure out a sensible way that I can go back to Brown Ledge, and spend a summer working there. I always come to the same conclusion: my girls are there now, and it's THEIR turn. What a gift I had this weekend when I stole a moment with Grace after theater, as we paused for Taps together while we were walking down the point. It has been 30 years since my first summer at camp, and the traditions remain honored. The organization of a Brown Ledge day remains predictable in a comforting way, even with it's lack of a schedule!

The campers have a high respect for the traditions, rules, staff, and each other. In turn, they are treated with a similar consideration. Each girl learns to applaud the success of another, and everyone wins. The self confidence that the girls return home with after four or eight weeks at camp makes them stronger young women for the following 10 months at home.

Brown Ledge not only looks beautiful, with gardens, a renovated barn, and a new theater lighting grid, but it is ALIVE with healthy and beautiful young girls and women who are having the time of their lives.

subtly involved in the daily routine. They walk around and know how departments are running and yet in the Brown Ledge way often allow departments to figure things out for themselves. Kathy also spends time using her skills to listen to issues and resolve conflicts. She writes the parent newsletters and does the impossible job of placing campers in cabins and honoring their bunkie requests. She is also responsible for the beautiful flower gardens all around camp. All the while, they oversee the equipment, boats, cars, horses and everything else that is needed to keep camp running. They have the fiscal responsibility of insuring that the budget is stuck to while keeping track of bills, petty cash, salary advances, store accounts and many more details. They actively work with the Board of Directors to plan

When we had the American Camping Accreditation visit in July, we had to answer hundreds of questions to provide proof that we met the standards of the ACA. This process is rigorous and demands that we have validated training of staff and have policies for all kinds of scenarios that could happen at camp. Over the years, these policies have been developed and printed in a 27 page staff handbook. The training at pre-camp is largely unchanged but the amount of information given to staff in writing has grown exponentially in the past 30 years.

for the financial future of camp.

Keeping camp in line with the changes in society has also been a challenge. In the beginning the majority of campers were full season. Now, as campers need to go to soccer camp or do community service or split time between parents, more campers can only manage to come for one month. Campers who are serious riders cannot miss 4 or 8 weeks of horse shows with their pony club. There is also the added pressure of getting a summer job to begin saving for skyrocketing college costs. Real world interest in dance and soccer has added programs and teams at BLC to allow campers to develop their talents. While the programs at camp have remained solid, they have adapted and changed to the demands of the outside world.

Bill and Kathy have overseen these changes but

fundamentally have ensured that the camp that we all love has basically survived and flourished. Many camps in the area have closed over the years, but thanks to their leadership, camp is not only full but also has 47 JC's this summer. Thanks to the hard work and dedication of Bill and Kathy to the Brown Ledge philosophy and all that it takes to run camp, we can continue to count on the patterns of Brown Ledge to continue for years to come!

What were other BLC accomplishments that you achieved other than the awards? Drill team co-captain as IC

Accommodations/Facilities/Equipment: Martha had been introduced to several other camps prior to finding BLC. She found out about BLC the way many of us did; a classmate brought the catalog to school and Martha "just knew it was for me. From the very first letter from Mr. Brown, I and my parents knew this was indeed special!"

Although Martha went back to camp several years ago and found it to be immediately "familiar" despite the physical changes, there are some differences. The activities remain about the same. Apparently the rule of not driving the boat through the swimming/diving area was routinely violated by HEB himself. Martha said that campers and staff alike learned to "watch out!" when HEB was taking people aquaplaning! There were three docks; swimming, sailing and canoeing. The diving boards and high tower came off of the swimming dock. Swimsuits were two pieces but were shorts and bra-style tops and, in 1945, might not contain elastic!

Memories of camp: The girls had uniforms when Martha started at camp - collared shirt, shorts and sweatshirt, although, for the most part, they were not worn. She doesn't recall uniforms after that first year or two. Flip flops were not yet en vogue but Martha and her friends wore moccasins. These shoes were perfect for "not slipping down the point and tripping on the roots." The cabins, though fewer of them, were still arranged as they are today and furnished with a single light bulb on each side. Martha does not recall writing on cabin walls. The dining hall was where it is now but was only the original structure prior to its expansions.

An interesting fact is that Martha's first year at BLC was the last year of WWII. She believes that prior to camp, parents of campers would have to give the ration cards to the Browns in order that food was procured for the campers. There was very little meat or sugar that summer and "a whole lot of peanut butter... but I don't ever recall feeling I didn't get enough to eat."The camp store existed next to the dining room and Martha recalls supplementing her diet with Milky Way Bars when available. There was no payphone so if you needed to make a call, you had to go to the Brown's cabin (which was apparently NOT something that people did!). In almost post war America, BLC cost \$400 for a full summer in 1945!!

Arriving at camp was mostly by car and train; no one was flying commercially at this time. Most BLers came from Connecticut, New Jersey, New York, etc. and either their parents would drive them or they would take the train from Grand Central Station into Burlington. Like the "plane party" of the 80s and 90s, the girls would all meet a counselor at Grand Central and ride the same train into Vermont. Martha and I joked that the train car passengers much like the other people on our planes were likely not excited to share several hours with "a bunch of giggling girls."

Leaving camp remains solidly unchanged; tears and adults tearing campers, counselors, JCs away from each other. Martha assured me she "was able to cry all the way back to New Jersey." The schedule of camp remains largely unchanged. There were bugles and meals in the dining hall. Martha recalls how great it was to wake up and think "I think I want to work on my tennis today or maybe I will go to riflery." It does appear campers were able to wake the counselors up if they wanted an early morning swim – this was a hazard of living in the Point House! There was a Saturday evening theatre but not to the degree we have now. There was no formal theatre the first couple of years, until the Recreation Hall with indoor stage was built. As she remembers, the first level of the Point House and the outdoor stage, next to the riding ring were used for the Saturday evening entertainment. No one dressed up. Martha believes the theatre took off when Barbara returned from Broadway. On Sundays, the campers and staff still wore white. Lunch was not a quiet meal as we have it now. The campers and staff could attend chapel and there were "Ledgers", which Martha thinks of as campfires. Providing the weather was good, the entire camp would taxi via canoe across the crib to Mosquito Island for a large campfire. This was a "quiet and reflective" time. Mr. Brown would speak "about peace, justice, treatment of fellow campers...it wasn't preachy, it was meditating and spiritual." Sometimes counselors would speak as well. There was singing and people brought guitars. Martha says they sang "traditional campfire songs" but we could not determine if they were similar to our Sunday Songs. Though they did not close camp events with our traditional

"Goodnight Song" both songs "There Is a Camp on Malletts Bay" and "When You Come to the End of a Brown Ledge Day" were familiar to her (as separate songs at that time). Rest hour existed after lunch. JCs visited campers. Unlike our first phone call home, since there was only one phone at camp, campers were required to write a letter home within the first week of camp, and cabin counselors ensured this was done.

What are your fondest memories?

Martha says that every memory could be a favorite and still recalls BLC as some of the best times in her life. What does stand out is HEB standing up in the dining hall and announcing to the camp that the Americans had dropped an atomic bomb on Japan. She cannot recall exactly what he said after that but recalls that she was impressed and moved by his words about what this could mean for the future of our world.

What was the most significant positive experience you had at BLC?

Positive experiences include the friendships, the sense of accomplishments and knowing the Browns.

What impact has BLC made in your life? "Brown Ledge was one of the two major influences in my life besides my family. Camp and Wellesley College shaped the adult person I became."

THEATRE LIGHTING SHINING BRIGHT

After two years of fundraising for the new lighting grid in the theatre, the project became a reality this spring. To meet current building code, we had to install a support system which did not rely on support from the roof structure. The structural engineer of the project came up with the plan to build



an arch below the roof that supports the weight of the grid. This change has most influenced **Richard Currie** who has been lighting Brown Ledge productions for over 40 years. "The new grid is amazing. Two new double wide arches were added to the building to support it. They soar beautifully. On the top bleachers a long bench holds them apart and gives more seating. I can push a button and the grid lowers to within easy reach. We can stand on a chair or a six foot ladder to hang, focus and gel. There are four motors, one at each corner, each one can hold one and a half tons. They are attached to the grid and climb a chain to raise the grid. I asked the designer if we could fly someone from the grid and he said it was the owner's choice!"

And as this Ledger is going to print, the announcement was made in the dining room, that this year's musical will be

Urinetown, The Musical.

A LETTER FROM THE DIRECTORS

Dear Brown Ledgers,

As you read this, the 2012 season at BLC is well into the August session, quickly headed for final events. The campers and JCs have embraced all that camp offers, expending energy we wish we had, and putting their own mark on the summer. The counselors this summer are talented and fun loving and they seem to find life and work here to be exhilarating, satisfying and exhausting.

This spring's renovation of the barn has made a solid difference for riders. There is a calmness among the horses that has been absent in recent years, facilitated by stall size and design. Now campers tack- up in the stalls, each of which is 10' by 10' and has cross-ties. New lighting has improved visibility, and a new roof with reflective insulation has reduced the temperature on hot days, which is almost every day this summer. Taken together, these changes have increased the happiness and confidence of horses, riders and staff, and made the experience richer for all.

The theatre had a new lighting grid installed last spring and the design and installation proved to be no small engineering feat. Construction of a laminated wooden arch system was required to provide proper support. Chain motors allow the grid to descend nearly to the arena floor, improving the ease and safety of lighting fixture placement. The finished product meets current lighting codes while it allows for more lighting design flexibility. If you stop by the theatre during stagecraft hours, Richard Currie will happily, gleefully, give you a demonstration.

JCs this year number 47 (last year the number was 43) and we are woefully short of room to comfortably house them all. To rectify the situation for the summer of 2012, a portion of the Clubhouse was remodeled to house the 2nd year JCs. While the 2nd years are happy and enjoying the summer, the Clubhouse is by no means a permanent solution and construction of a new Annex is scheduled to begin in the fall.

Great staff, appropriate facilities and the right equipment help produce the quintessential Brown Ledge experience each summer. Combined with our unique freedom plan, these elements provide the basis for joyful and meaningful camp days. No wonder so many of you say that Brown Ledge was the place where you learned the most, where you became the person you are today and where you formed many of the most significant relationships of your life.

The challenge for the camp directors and the board is to adequately support and fund this combination of ingredients. Our program is costly to run and produces income only two months a year and in recent years we have experienced a steady increase in requests for scholarships. This year we have the added burden of supporting the barn, theater and Annex projects. We extend our heartfelt thanks to the over 200 of you who have helped support our funding efforts. If you are considering becoming a donor or you have the ability to increase your giving level, please know that your gift will be happily received and wisely used.
